Dixie Art Colony Foundation partial schedule for the year 2019

Wetumpka, Alabama—The Dixie Art Colony Foundation will kickoff their 2019 schedule with a "Lunch & Learn" program at 11:30 am on Thursday, January 17 at Trinity Episcopal Church in Wetumpka, Alabama. The January program will also serve as an introduction for a series of events about Alabama's participation in the Great Depression-Era Federal Art Projects. According to Mark Harris, President and Director of the Dixie Art Colony Foundation, there are four treasures tucked away in the city of Wetumpka that were painted in 1942 as part of one the Federal New Deal Art Projects. The four mural-sized oil paintings were originally painted for the Post Library at Maxwell Field in nearby Montgomery. Harris continued, "The paintings were rescued by Elmore County Superintendent of Education Ross McQueen in 1964 after the Post Library at what is now called Maxwell Air Force Base was demolished to make roon for new construction." Harris, a graduate of Wetumpka High School said he remembers when the large paintings hung in the old WHS auditorium located on West Tallassee Street. Harris who also fondly remembers Mr. McQueen explained, "My understanding is that when the paintings were placed in the custody of the Elmore County Board of education in 1964, it was with the stipulation that the paintings would not be separated in future. The four paintings illustrate important events in Alabama's history.

Through extensive research which began in 2013, Harris, with the assistance of Karen Henricks, Ph.D., was the first to identify that the Elmore County Board of Education paintings were created though Alabama's arm of the New Deal Federal Art Projects. He was also able to confirm that E. Herndon Smith, then director of the W.P.A. Art Projects for the state of Alabama and a major player in the development of the paintings was a participant in Elmore County's Dixie Art Colony. Other artists that assisted in the development of the paintings were Pvt. Harlyn G. Dickinson, Cpl. Mario Pagano and Pvt. Joseph Becker, all three were stationed at Maxwell Field.

Part of the DAC Foundation's mission is to research, collect, document, and preserve the history related to the Dixie Art Colony and the artists that participated. As part of the DAC Foundation's quest to inform and educate the public about this important part of Alabama's history, the series of programs about Alabama's Great Depression-Era public art projects will continue through the year 2020. Through these programs, the DAC Foundation will share details about each of the four artists involved in the Elmore County Board of Education paintings, photographs and newspaper clippings related to the paintings, and presentations about Federal Art Projects completed by three other Dixie Art Colony artists. Karen Henricks, Ph.D., a retired art historian and leading expert about Alabama's participation in the New Deal Federal Art Projects, will assist with the programs. Henricks is also member of the DAC Foundation's Advisory Council.


